

175g brown bread mix

250ml hot water

10g garlic puree

200g chopped tomatoes

15g vegetable bouillon paste

10g of mixed herbs

300g of grated cheese

Method

- 1. Make the base following the instructions on the bread mix packet.
- 2. Put the water, garlic puree, chopped tomatoes, herbs and vegetable paste in a pan and reduce to a paste.
- 3. Spread over the base and sprinkle over the cheese.
- 4. Cook in an oven. The temperature will be on the bread mix pack- 2. Shape into cookies and place on a et.

PE Kit


- Plain black athletic shorts /skort / tracksuit bottoms / running trousers or leggings

Dress Down Friday:


- The top half of your clothing has to be school uniform, this means that you should wear what you would wear to school Monday – Thursday.
