We've said a sad "Goodbye" to members of staff, Mr Morris and Ms Smith, we will miss you, but wish you well for the future.



Our Nativity was all about the Christmas story told from the twinkly stars perspective! Our donkey made some funny jokes.






The Year 2 Nativity ~ 'I'm Gonna Shine'



Witchy Walk!

Year 4 visited Lancaster Castle and the site of the execution of the Lancashire Witches in 1612.

At the start of the half term, Year 4 visited Lancaster Castle and then walked up to Highfield, the site of the hanging of the Lancashire Witches on 20th August 1612.

Last half term, Y4 learned all about the events leading up to the Lancashire Witch trials of 1612 and their aftermath. We learned how people at that time really believed in the existence of witches, even King James I wrote a book about them called "Daemonologie" in which he told everyone it was their duty to seek out witches in our country and get rid of them! Can you believe it?

We looked at the court rooms and the prison cells. It must have been horrible to be locked up there!

Victoria showed us equipment of torture and punishment, including a branding iron which was used to burn a mark on people to show they were thieves.

Once we left the Castle, we

We looked at all the features which wouldn't have been there in 1612, as they witches were taken to "the moors outside Lancaster" which is what Highfield was in 1612. Mrs Dyer wondered what kind of a day it was when they were hanged, was the sun shining? It was August after all.

We realised that all the buildings we could see, including Williamson's Park, the canal and the cemetery wouldn't have been there at the time of the hanging.

We all enjoyed our time in the Castle and although we got wet walking, it was interesting to see the changes in Lancaster over time and where the witches met

Year 5 Victorian Day

One of the many activities we did on Victorian Day was visiting the Judges Lodgings. Staff were dressed up as Victorian Ladies and Gentlemen and greeted us. We walked into the lodgings through the colossal entrance, which was right by the gift shop! In the gift shop, there were all sorts of Victorian artefacts such as hobbyhorses, handcuffs and marbles. We went up the grand staircase and into the classroom. The classroom had many different Victorian items including an abacus, inkpots, desks that could open up, a large bell, and a chalkboard with a mantra saying "better best". There were many other items such as a dunce hat, old football cards, chalk with slate, charcoal and a Union Jack flag.

We then visited a Victorian-style kitchen with our tour-guide. Our guide showed us some old equipment such as a rotisserie, troughs, pots and pans. The first thing we noticed when entering the kitchen was a massive table in the middle where they would have worked on all the food. There were ingredients such as flour and sugar and then even dead birds hanging from the ceiling. The kitchen also had equipment for laundry.

Later in the day we were shown Victorian bedrooms and even a nursery. In the nursery there were Victorian toys which we tried playing with. Some of the toys "Different toys from different eras such as Edwardian, Victorian and the World Wars right up to the 2000's" - Kathrine

The Victorian toys were limited in what materials they were made out of, with only a few materials available such as wood, clay, paper, cotton, wool, string and glass. Lodgings, we continued our Victorian Day with activities. We tried different Victorian playground games. We played tugof-war, hopscotch, croquet, marbles, blind man's bluff, football, skipping, granny's footsteps, clapping games, arm twists, noughts and crosses, dress-up, and chalk drawing. Many of these activities were only for rich Victorians and so poor people were stuck with playing with wooden toys.

We continued Victorian Day at lunchtime in our classroom. We marched around the long tables before we ate. We each got a bowl of gruel for our lunch. It was salty, warm and lumpy. Reception were introduced to their buddies, who they see every Friday.




